SAINT OF THE WEEK

ST THERESA OF AVILA (1515-1582) - Feast day 15th October

Patron Saint: Headache sufferers, Catholic writers, loss of parents, lace workers.

St Theresa of Avila is one of only 4 women given the honour of Doctor of the Church, in recognition of her writings and teachings on contemplative prayer. However, Theresa's spiritual journey was not an easy one, she struggled with her holiness, closeness to God and in particular her prayer life as a young nun.

Theresa was born in 1515, in Avila, Spain. She came from a well-off family but her father was very strict and despaired of Theresa as a teenager because she was...well, just like many teenage girls, interested in clothes, her friends and being a bit of a rebel! So, he



sent her off to a convent. She hated it at first, but over time grew to enjoy it thanks to her developing friendship with God plus the convent wasn't as strict as her Dad! She took her vows at 20 but found praying difficult because, as she put it, 'My imagination is so dull that I had no talent for imagining or coming up with great theological thoughts.'

She was a popular girl and placed a lot of emphasis on her friends, who she liked to sit and gossip with (I'm sure we can all relate to that)! After suffering from a particularly bad bout of malaria, which left her paralysed for 3 years she stopped praying completely. At the age of 41, a priest convinced her to start praying again but she still found it a trial. 'I was more anxious for the hour of prayer to be over than I was to remain there. I don't know what heavy penance I would have gladly undertaken rather than practice prayer.'

St Theresa's struggle with her prayer life no doubt resonates with many of us at different times of our lives. It can be difficult to set aside time to give to God, to find the right words to say, the level of concentration required. Yet, from her own struggles, St Theresa has written about how her prayer life, and as such her relationship with God, developed. She likened prayer to a conversation between friends. 'For mental prayer, in my opinion, is nothing else than an intimate sharing between friends; it means taking time frequently to be alone with Him who we know loves us. The important thing is not to think much but to love much, and so, do that which best stirs you to love. Love is not great delight, but desire to please God in everything.'

In her autobiography she shares her insights for mystical prayer, using the analogy of a garden. She said that letting God into your heart is like letting him plant seeds in your life. When we pray and help others, we help the seeds grow.

St Theresa is credited with being one of the great reformers of the Church, at a time when corruption was rife and the Reformation was threatening its very existence. She initiated a reform of the Carmelite Order to which she belonged, by insisting that their vows of poverty, chastity and obedience were followed with great zeal and vigour. She founded the Reformed Discalced (Barefoot) Carmelite Convent of St. Joseph, the first of many. St Theresa's rule consisted of a simple monastic life of continual prayer, manual labour, abstinence, fasting, and charity. She died on the 15th October 1582 and her last words were, "O my Lord and my Spouse, the hour that I have longed for has come. It is time to meet one another."
