SAINT OF THE WEEK

ST PAUL OF THE CROSS (1694-1774) - Feast day 19th October

Patron Saint: Hungary, The Passionist Order

St Paul of the Cross was born Paolo Francesco Daneii in Liguria, Italy, the second child of 16! His family were very devout and Paul himself was a holy child, spending much of his time in prayer, hearing daily mass and adoring the Blessed Sacrament. A defining incident in his childhood occurred when Paul and his brother John Baptist fell into a river and were rescued by a beautiful lady, whom they understood to be Our Blessed Mother.

Paul experienced a conversion to a life of prayer at the age of 19, but he struggled to find an order of priests he wanted to join. This changed in 1720 when he had a vision of Mary clothed in a black religious habit, which had on it a black and white heart with a white cross on top. Written on the heart were the words, 'the Passion of Jesus Christ', and under these words were three nails in white. Our Lady told Paul, "This is the way you must be clothed. You must found an order in which the members are dressed in the same way. They must always think of the sufferings and death of my Dear Son!"

Shortly after this Paul went on retreat for 40 days to write the Rule of his new order, we now know them as The Passionists. During this time, he fasted and prayed and spent many hours before the Blessed Sacrament, being visited by Saints who instructed him and helped him - 'I wrote as quickly as if someone were dictating to me; I felt the words coming from my heart!' The community was to live a penitential life, in solitude and poverty, teaching people, in the easiest possible way, how to meditate on the Passion of Jesus. To begin with St Paul of the Cross was the only member of his order until his brother, John Baptist joined him. The brothers devoted their energies to preaching in parishes, particularly remote places where communities had no priests.

St. Paul of the Cross was an extraordinary preacher who possessed many of the mystical gifts we have been reading about with our previous 'Saints of the Week', including prophecy, bi-location, supernatural perfumes, visions, power over nature and levitation. Great crowds followed him wherever he went and he performed many miracles. His life was full of penances and mortifications, offered to save souls and for the success of his preaching missions. One of his well-known penances was that he would walk barefoot wherever he went, regardless of the terrain or the weather!

St. Paul of the Cross suffered greatly and for much of his religious life experienced dryness and desolation of spirit. As many of our great saints have experienced, being close to Jesus means carrying His Cross with him too. Paul had to place his trust in God, so that even though he could not feel His Presence he still believed that God was with him, helping him along the road to Heaven.

The first Passionist Retreat was opened in 1737 on Monte Argentario after St Paul had a vision of Mary telling him to form a monastery there. Paul called his monasteries "retreats", to underline the life of solitude and contemplation, which he believed was necessary for someone who wished to preach the message of the Cross. There is a Passionist Retreat based at St Mungo's parish, serving the people of Glasgow. Today the Passionist order follow in the footsteps of their founder as they 'seek to remind people of the love of God which we see in the Passion of Jesus and to respond with love to those who suffer today.' Please remember them in your prayers.
