#### **ADVENT 2020 - RORATE CAELI MASSES**

On the Friday mornings of Advent (4<sup>th</sup>, 11<sup>th</sup> and 18th Dec) there will be an additional Mass offered at 7:30am. These Masses will be simple, prayerful, and illuminated only by candlelight - a perfect way to begin the day and a fitting way to prepare for Christmas. **No booking necessary.** 

The Rorate Caeli Mass is a traditional Advent devotion wherein the Mass of the Blessed Virgin Mary for Advent is offered just before daybreak. The interplay of light and darkness speaks to the meaning of Advent and the coming of the Light of the world.

The Mass takes its title, Rorate Caeli, from the first words of the Introit, which are from Isaiah 45:8:

"Rorate, caeli, desuper, et nubes pluant justum, aperiatur terra, et germinet Salvatorem."

"Drop down dew, ye heavens, from above, and let the clouds rain the just: let the earth be opened and bud forth a Saviour."

The Rorate Mass is lit only by candlelight. Because it is a votive Mass in Mary's honour, white vestments are worn instead of Advent violet. In the dimly lit setting, priests and faithful prepare to honour the Light of the world, Who is soon to be born, and offer praise to God for the gift of Our Lady. As the Mass proceeds and sunrise approaches, the church becomes progressively brighter, illumined by the sun as our Faith is illumined by Christ.

The readings and prayers of the Mass foretell the prophecy of the Virgin who would bear a Son called Emmanuel, and call on all to raise the gates of their hearts and their societies to let Christ the King enter; asking for the grace to receive eternal life by the merits of the Incarnation and saving Resurrection of Our Lord.

# **SAINT OF THE WEEK**

ST FRANCIS XAVIER (1506-1552) - Feast Day: 3rd December

Patron Saint: Missions, plague epidemics, navigators

Could you imagine spending 13 months on a boat on a voyage to far-away lands? As someone who suffers from bad travel sickness, it makes me queasy just thinking about it! But that's what St Francis Xavier did on his mission to India to spread the Good News of the Gospel. Conditions on the voyage were pretty grim - they were shipwrecked 3 times, spent days without food and had outbreaks of scurvy to contend with. A far cry from the kind of lifestyle Francis had grown up with.



Francis was used to the finer things in life having been brought up in the royal castle of Xavier, Spain, where his father was the seneschal (steward). He was a clever child and his education was encouraged. He was sent to university in Paris and ended up sharing lodgings with Ignatius of Loyola. Francis wasn't overly impressed with his new lodger, especially as he was trying to persuade him to become a priest. At the time Francis was more impressed with what the world had to offer than God and was put off by Ignatius and his rigorous spiritual lifestyle. He continued with his studies and in 1530 received a Master of Arts. Ignatius eventually persuaded Francis to dedicate his life to God and on 15 August 1534, the 2 of them along with 5 other companions met in a crypt beneath the Church of Saint Denis, Paris and became the founding members of the Society of Jesus, or the Jesuits as they are more commonly known today. They made vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience to the Pope.

So how did Francis end up on a ship to India? The King of Portugal requested missionaries to go to India to their recently acquired Portuguese colonies. Francis was reluctantly chosen to go. When Francis finally arrived in Goa, on the west coast of India, he was appalled at how cruelly the Europeans treated the local people and how their Christian faith and values had been lost. So, this is where his work began. He would walk the streets ringing a bell to call the children to him and would sit under an umbrella telling them Bible stories. When he journeyed along the coast to visit other Portuguese settlements, he was surprised and delighted to find a group of Indians who worshipped Jesus in the same way as the earliest Christians. These people were known as the Christians of St Thomas, their faith had been brought to them centuries earlier by St Thomas the Apostle.

Francis spent the next few years journeying through India preaching, working miracles and even raising the dead to life! He travelled further East to Portuguese settlements in Southeast Asia. When he was there, he met a Japanese man named, Anjirō who had fled Japan after being charged with murder. He told Francis extensively about the customs and culture of his homeland and became the first Japanese Christian, adopting the name of 'Paulo de Santa Fé'. He later helped Xavier as a mediator and interpreter for the mission to Japan. The Good News of the Gospel was met with mixed responses in Japan, some local rulers made him welcome and allowed him to preach, others simply turned him away. Francis was keen to travel to China and convert the Chinese as he believed this would also help his mission in Japan. However, he never made it to China, dying from a fever on the Japanese Island of Shangchuan, off the coast of China on 3<sup>rd</sup> December 1552, aged 46.

By the time of his death, St Francis Xavier had converted many thousands to Christianity and is regarded as being the greatest missionary since St Paul. His body is preserved incorrupt in the Basilica of Bom Jesus in Goa.
