USE OF BELLS IN THE CATHOLIC CHURCH – HISTORY AND SIGNIFICANCE

As part of our 80th Anniversary celebrations we have reinstated the Church bells that Canon Gibbons installed in 2001 and we are looking forward to hearing them ringing out in Rutherglen, calling the Faithful to Mass and to prayer.

At Mass we use small altar or 'sanctum' bells, rung by the altar servers at specific parts of the Mass. These are:-



- At the *epiclesis*, when the priest places his hands over the bread and wine and prays to the Holy Spirit to change them into the Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus Christ.
- At the Consecration when the priest presents and elevates the Body of Christ
- And again, when the priest presents and elevates the Blood of Christ
- They may also be rung again when the priest consumes from the Chalice.

The primary purpose of the bells is to create a joyful noise to the Lord as a way of giving thanks for the miracles taking place on the altar, as described in the Book of Psalms –

Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the earth; break forth into joyous song and sing praises!

A secondary purpose is to focus the attention of the faithful that transubstantiation has taken place and that the Body and Blood of our Lord is truly present on the altar.

We can trace the use of bells to honour and assist in our worship of God to Biblical times. The Book of Exodus (28:33-35) describes the vestments worn by Aaron, in his role as high Priest, as being adorned with bells.

'And beneath at the feet of the same tunic round about, you shall make as it were pomegranates of violet and purple and scarlet twice dyed with little bells set between, so that there shall be a golden bell and a pomegranate and again another golden bell and a pomegranate. And Aaron shall be vested with it in the office of his ministry, that the sound may be heard, when he goes in and comes out of the sanctuary, in the sight of the Lord and that he may not die.'

The addition of bells to Aaron's priestly garments would have created a joyful noise to the Lord, something we should all aspire to! In addition, bells have long been thought to have apotropaic powers (power to ward off evil spirits) and some bells had inscriptions to reflect this eg. 'the sound of this bell vanquishes tempests, repels demons, and summons men.'

St Paulinus, a 6th Century Roman missionary and the first Bishop of York, was the first to use them as a means to summon monks to worship and following on from this, Pope Sabinian approved the use of bells to call the faithful to worship. In the 13th Century, outdoor tower bells started being used as *sanctum* bells and some historic churches such as St Peter's Basilica in Rome still use them. Ringing the bells gave notice to those outside who couldn't attend the Mass that something divine and miraculous was taking place inside. The ringing of the bell would allow the faithful to stop what they were doing and offer an act of adoration to God.

Traditionally Catholic Christian churches would ring their bells three times a day to call the faithful to recite the Angelus; a prayer recited in honour of the Incarnation of God. It is our intention to ring our own Church bells at noon and 6pm to revive this great tradition of the Catholic Church in Rutherglen!
