

SAINT OF THE WEEK <u>ST. SEBASTIAN (256-288) – Feast day 20th January</u> Patron Saint: Soldiers, plague-stricken, archers, athletes

St Sebastian was an early Christian saint and martyr who was responsible for converting many souls to Christ at a time when Christians were still being persecuted and put to death for their faith. Sebastian joined the Roman army in 283, his primary goal in doing so, was to be able to assist Christian martyrs without arousing the suspicion of the authorities. He was clearly a brave and loyal soldier as he was appointed to be a captain of the Praetorian Guards. This was an elite unit of the Imperial Roman army whose members served as personal bodyguards and intelligence for Roman emperors.



During his time in the Roman army, Sebastian was able to help and convert many souls. Marcus and Marcellian were twin brothers from a distinguished family and were deacons. The brothers refused to sacrifice to the Roman gods and were arrested. Their parents Tranquillinus and Martia visited them in prison and begged them to renounce their faith. Sebastian visited the brothers and convinced them to stay true to their faith, even when faced with death and also succeeded in converting their parents too! Nicostratus, who was a prison guard and his wife Zoe were converted by St. Sebastian. Zoe had been a mute for six years, as soon as she converted to Christianity her speech returned to her. Nicostratus then brought the rest of the prisoners who were converted by Sebastian. I'm not sure if this all happened during his visit to Marcus and Marcellian, but either way St Sebastian was clearly a force to be reckoned with when it came to his Christian faith and converting souls because he didn't stop there. Chromatius, who was the prefect of Rome at the time also converted after Sebastian cured his son of gout. Chromatius then set all of the prisoners free from the jail, freed his slaves, resigned his position and retired to the country!

Unsurprisingly, Sebastian's courageous efforts preaching the Gospel didn't go unnoticed and when it was brought to the attention of the Emperor Diocletian, he rebuked him for his betrayal and commanded he be led to a field, bound to a stake and archers were to shoot arrows at him until he was dead. Miraculously, the arrows did not kill him. The widow of Castulus (a servant of Diocletian and a Christian), Irene of Rome, went to retrieve his body to bury it, and discovered he was still alive. She brought him back to her house and nursed him back to health. After surviving one attempt on his life, you would have thought Sebastian would have kept a low profile, but, in testament to his courage and bravery, Sebastian actually sought out Diocletian so as to surprise him and then berated him for his cruel treatment of Christians. Diocletian was obviously surprised to see him alive but quickly recovered and gave orders for Sebastian to be seized and beaten to death with cudgels, and his body thrown into the common sewer. His body was recovered by a Christian woman named Lucina who privately removed his body and buried it in the catacombs at the entrance of the cemetery of Calixtus, in Rome, where now stands the Basilica of St. Sebastian.

St Sebastian is the patron saint of athletes because of his physical endurance and his energetic way of spreading and defending the Faith. Sebastian is also patron to all soldiers. He was declared patron of plague sufferers of his reported cures of those afflicted with many diseases.
