SAINT OF THE WEEK SAINTS TIMOTHY AND TITUS – 26TH JANUARY

St. Timothy and St. Titus were early Christian missionaries and disciples of St. Paul. They were very close companions to St. Paul who regarded them as his spiritual sons. The affection he has for them and the esteem he holds them in can be seen in his letters to them and also the importance of the missions they were entrusted with.





ST. TIMOTHY (17-97) Patron Saint:- Invoked against stomach disorders St. Timothy was born in Lystra, now part of modern-day Turkey to a Greek father and a Jewish mother. Although Timothy was not brought up as a Jew due to his parent's mixed marriage, he was said to be familiar with the Scriptures from an early age. His Gran, Lois and his Mum, Eunice are named in Paul's 2nd letter to Timothy as being of 'sincere faith'.


During Paul's first visit to Lystra, he performed many miracles, including curing a man paralysed from birth. Many were converted to Christianity

at this time. When St. Paul returned to Lystra, Timothy, his Gran and his Mum were respected members of the Christian congregation.

St. Paul's letters reveal aspects of Timothy's personality to us and the fatherly love that Paul felt for him. In one of his letters to the Corinthians, Paul asks them to be nice to Timothy and go easy on him, possibly indicating that Timothy was of a more reserved and timid nature. It would appear that he didn't keep good health. Paul urges him to 'have a little wine for the sake of your digestion and the frequent bouts of illness you have'. And in his letter to the Philippians, Paul heaps praise on his spiritual son telling them 'I have nobody else like him here'.

Timothy was a constant companion to St. Paul during many of his missions to places such as, Macedonia, Corinth, Thessalonica and Ephesus and is referenced in many of the Pauline letters. In the year 64, Paul ordained Timothy a Bishop in Ephesus and left him in charge of the Church there. When Paul was in prison and awaiting martyrdom, it was his beloved Timothy he summoned from Ephesus for a last farewell.

St. Timothy was Bishop of Ephesus for 15 years. He died a martyr when he tried to stop the people of Ephesus celebrating a festival for their pagan gods. The crowd reacted angrily and attacked him, beating him and stoning him to death.



ST. TITUS (1ST CENTURY – 107) Patron Saint:- US Army Chaplain Corps

Titus was a Greek, born in Antioch who was a keen student of Hellenistic principles and philosophy and was said to have lived a virtuous life, unlike the lifestyles of his pagan peers. He was converted to Christianity by Paul and baptised by him.

Paul speaks with much respect and admiration for Titus in his letter to him where he addresses him as **'true child of mine in the faith that we share.'** St. Titus was a trusted companion, serving as a secretary,

translator and ambassador for St. Paul.

Titus must have had a strong personality and been an eloquent, persuasive pastoral leader because Paul sent him to Corinth to deal with the fall out and dissension of the Church there; where there seems to have been a challenge to Paul's leadership and teachings. Titus was successful in smoothing relations between Corinth and St Paul, who was overjoyed at Titus' success.

As a sign of his esteem, St Paul ordained Titus as Bishop of Crete and left him in charge of the Church there. His letter to Titus gives him instructions for the Church in Crete. Paul clearly didn't hold Cretans in high regard when he said **'Cretans were never anything but liars, dangerous animals and lazy: and that is a true statement.'** He warned Titus he would need to **'be severe in correcting them and making them sound in the faith'** and gives him requirements and duties for the bishops and elders of the Cretan Church. After many years of service and leadership, Titus died peacefully in Crete.
