SAINT OF THE WEEK

ST PAUL MIKI AND COMPANIONS - Feast day 6th February

Patron Saint: Japan

This week sees the Church honour the 26 Martyrs of Nagasaki, a group of native Japanese Catholics and foreign missionaries who suffered death for their faith in the year 1597.

Christianity was brought to Japan in the 1500's by one of our previous



saints of the week, St. Francis Xavier. The Japanese people and their rulers were intelligent people who enjoyed discussing religion and philosophy and they initially welcomed Christianity. Within 40 years of St Francis Xavier arriving in Japan over 200,000 had been converted. But over time, the rulers of Japan became suspicious of Christians and the missionaries sent from Spain and Portugal; believing that they were part of a plan to conquer and rule Japan. The authorities responded by making it a crime to be a Christian. Relations soured further when a Spanish ship seized off the coast of Japan was found to be carrying artillery. In response, 26 Catholics were sentenced to death.

Paul Miki was one of the 26 who was in training to be a Jesuit priest. Had he lived to complete his training, he would have been the first native Japanese priest. He was the son of a noble and respected Japanese family who was well educated and reportedly a brilliant preacher. He was 33 years old when he was arrested and sentenced to death. The group also consisted of John of Gotó and James Kisai, who were Japanese and members of the Jesuits, 6 foreign Franciscan missionaries and several lay Catholics, some of them children as young as 10.

St Paul and his companions were sentenced to death by crucifixion and lancing. Before this they were tortured, chained together and forced to march 600 miles to Nagasaki. They were marched through villages as an example to the villagers of what happened to those who followed Christ. Along the way they preached to the people who had come out to see them. They sang psalms of praise and joy. They prayed the rosary and told the people that such a martyrdom was an occasion of rejoicing, not of sadness. When the prisoners arrived at their place of execution, known today as Martyr's Hill, they were allowed to go to Confession one last time. Then iron collars were clamped around their necks and chains placed around their legs and arms. The prisoners were hung on the crosses by the chains. One soldier stood by each of the prisoners, holding a raised sword, and at the call from their superior thrust the sword into the bodies of the prisoners.

Despite everything he had been through and knowing he was about to die, St Paul Miki used his last moments to preach to the gathered crowd;

"The only reason for my being killed is that I have taught the doctrine of Christ. I thank God it is for this reason that I die. I believe that I am telling the truth before I die. I know you believe me and I want to say to you all once again: Ask Christ to help you to become happy. I obey Christ. After Christ's example, I forgive my persecutors. I do not hate them. I ask God to have pity on all, and I hope my blood will fall on my fellow men as a fruitful rain."

In the 1860's, Japan allowed foreigners back into their country and to the surprise and delight of the missionaries they found Catholics who had been worshipping in secret for 300 years! Beatified in 1627, the martyrs of Japan were finally canonized in 1862.
