SAINT OF THE WEEK ST COLETTE (1381-1447) – Feast day 6th MARCH Patron Saint – Women seeking to conceive, expectant mothers, sick children

St Colette was a French abbess and the founder of the reformed branch of the Poor Clare nuns, known as the Colettine Poor Clares. She was born Nicole Boellet on 13th January 1381, in Corbie in France. Her parents, Robert and Marguerite had grown old without having children. They prayed to St Nicholas for help in conceiving and at the age of 60 Marguerite gave birth to a daughter, whom they named Nicole; after the saint who answered their prayers. They affectionately called her Nicolette, which soon became shortened to Colette.



At the age of 17, Colette was orphaned and became a ward of the abbot of the Benedictine abbey, where her father had been a stone mason. Refusing to be married off she joined various different orders but couldn't find one to her liking. She finally settled on becoming an anchoress (a woman who was walled into a cell to live a life of prayer and contemplation) and joined the Third Order of Francis (lay members). She was bricked into her cell in 1402 and lived an ascetic way of life for a number of years. Through a series of visions and dreams, featuring St Francis and God, she came to understand that her calling was to reform the Second Order of Francis (nuns). However, her acceptance of her calling didn't come immediately, as St Colette was pretty stubborn and really struggled with what God was asking her to do. For her failure to see what God's plan was for her, Our Lord took away her sight. When she refused to listen to Him, he took away her hearing. Eventually worn down by her struggle she gave her heart and will over to God and agreed to do as He asked.

She transferred to the Order of Poor Clares and began her work of reform. In 1410 she opened her first monastery in Besancon; from there her reform spread. During her lifetime she founded 18 monasteries in France, Belgium and Germany. Today there are Colettine nuns in Ireland, UK, USA, Japan, Norway, Philippines and Spain. Colette's way of life involved extreme poverty, going barefoot and the observance of perpetual fasting and abstinence.

During her life Colette performed many miracles, including multiplication of food and wine and many stories of healing and cures. Her most well-known miracles and the reason for her patronages involve childbirth and babies! While travelling to Nice, Colette stayed at the home of a friend, whose wife was enduring a difficult labour and was facing death. Colette immediately went to the local church to pray for her. The mother gave birth successfully and survived the ordeal, which the mother attributed to Colette's prayers. Her daughter grew up to become a nun in one of Colette's monasteries and became Colette's secretary and biographer.

Another miracle attributed to Colette involved a local peasant woman who had a still born child. The distraught father took the baby to the local priest to have it baptised but as the baby was already dead the priest refused. As the father was so upset the priest suggested he take the baby to the nuns. Mother Colette, on hearing about the baby, took off her veil (given to her by the Pope), told the father to wrap the child's body in it and return to the priest. By the time he got back to the church the baby was conscious and crying and the priest immediately baptised the child.
