SAINT OF THE WEEK

ST JOSEPHINE BAKHITA – Feast day 8th February

Patron Saint: Sudan, Human trafficking survivors

St Josephine Bakhita was born in Olgossa, in the Darfur region of Sudan. Her family were members of the Daju tribe and her uncle was the tribal chief. She had a happy childhood, until, aged about 7, she was kidnapped by Arab slave traders. For the next 12 years she was bought and sold many times and spent so much time in captivity she forgot her birth name. The slave traders gave her the name Bakhita, which is Arabic for 'fortunate' or' lucky.'



Bakhita had many owners, some who treated her well, others who were horribly cruel. In her autobiography, Bakhita recalls the most terrifying incident of her captivity, when her mistress ordered her and her fellow slaves to be scarred, a traditional practice throughout Sudan. Flour was used to draw patterns onto the skin, then a razor blade was used to cut deeply into the skin. The wounds were then filled with salt to ensure permanent scarring. A total of 114 intricate patterns were cut into her breasts, belly and right arm.

One of Bakhita's masters was the Italian Vice Counsel, Callisto Legnani, who was a much kinder master and did not beat her. When he left Sudan to return home to Italy, Bakhita begged him to take her with him. He agreed and so began Bakhita's life in Italy. She was given away to another family and was a nanny to their children. Her new family had connections with Sudan and when her mistress decided to go to Sudan without Bakhita, she left her in the custody of the Canossian Sisters in Venice. This was to prove to be a turning point in Bakhita's life. Through the sister's she learnt about God and encountered Christianity for the first time in her life. She recalled, "Those holy mothers instructed me with heroic patience and introduced me to that God who from childhood I had felt in my heart without knowing who He was."

When Bakhita's mistress returned to claim her, she refused to leave. Her mistress tried in vain to persuade her to leave but she was adamant that she wanted to stay with the sisters. Her mistress appealed to the courts for help, who found that as slavery had been outlawed in Sudan before Bakhita was born she could not be lawfully made a slave...she was finally a free woman!!! For the first time in her life, she was free to decide what she wanted to do, who she wanted to be. She felt a call to follow Christ and chose to remain with the sisters.

On 9th January 1890, she was baptised, received her first Holy Communion and was confirmed by Archbishop Sarto, who would later become Pope Pius X. She took the name Josephine Margaret and Fortunata (Latin for the translation of her Arabic name). A few years later, she entered the novitiate of the Canossian Sisters and took her final vows on the 8th December 1896. During her 42 years as a Canossian sister she had many different jobs - cook, sacristan and door keeper - and was well known and loved by the local community. Her last years were marked by pain and sickness. She used a wheelchair but was always cheerful. If anyone asked how she was, she would always smile and answer, "as the Master desires."

The petitions for her canonization began immediately after her death. On 1 October 2000, she was canonized as Saint Josephine Bakhita by Pope St John Paul II. Bakhita's legacy is that transformation is possible through suffering - an outstanding example of Christian hope.
