BISHOPS OF SCOTLAND – RETURN TO WORSHIP IN TIME FOR EASTER

Responding to last week's statement on the reopening of Places of Worship by the First Minister, the Catholic Bishops of Scotland have issued a statement welcoming the move and calling for a removal of the cap, which limits the number of people who can attend. Instead, the bishops maintain congregation size should be calculated in accordance with the size of each church, a system similar to that used in the retail sector, which still maintains social distancing regulations. The full statement is below.

'As Scotland's Catholic bishops, we welcome the recent announcement by the First Minister foreseeing a return to our churches for the most important celebration of the liturgical year at Easter. We also welcome the recognition of the status of public worship implicit in this decision.

The Catholic Community recognises the seriousness of the pandemic and is committed to working with others to avoid the spreading of infection.

At the same time, we anticipate ongoing dialogue with the Scottish Government regarding the requirement of a numerical "cap" on the number of worshippers. As we continue to observe social distancing and the protocols on infection control and hygiene formulated by the Bishops' Conference working group under the leadership of the former Chief Medical Officer Sir Harry Burns, we maintain that it would be more appropriate for each church building to accommodate a congregation in proportion to its size rather than on the basis of an imposed number.

We echo here the timely words Pope Francis addressed to the representatives of countries to the Holy See on the 8th February 2021:

"Even as we seek ways to protect human lives from the spread of the virus, we cannot view the spiritual and moral dimension of the human person as less important than physical health.

The opening of churches is a sign that the sacrifices endured so far are bearing fruit and gives us hope and encouragement to persevere. We pray that the Risen Christ, for whom we long during this holy season of Lent, will bless and bring healing to our nation."

SAINT OF THE WEEK ST FRANCES OF ROME (1384-1440) – Feast day 9th MARCH Patron Saint – Motorists, widows and mothers

St Frances of Rome was born into a wealthy, aristocratic family and was married off by her father at the tender age of 12. Her husband, Lorenzo Ponziani was a commander of the papal troops and was himself from an extremely wealthy family. Frances wasn't very happy at being married, as she had wanted to become a nun. Unlike most girls her age she hated the parties, banquets and general merriment that went on in the high society of Rome. She struggled so much with her new married life that she became seriously ill. As her health deteriorated, she had a vision of St Alexis, who had also been from a noble family. He had run away from his home rather than be married. St Alexis told her God was giving her a choice....did she want to recover, did she want to live? In response, Frances gave herself over to God's will, which



proved a turning point in her illness and in her life. She recovered immediately and completely and devoted herself to her husband, who loved her dearly and only wanted for his wife to be happy.

During this time, she also found herself a friend and kindred spirit in her sister- in-law, Vannozza. She harboured the same desires as Frances, in that she had wanted to devote her life to God too, but like Frances had found herself married off by her family. The two girls became close friends. When Frances' mother-in-law died, she found herself having to run a large household at the age of just 16! By then she was a mother as well, and Frances and Vannozza agreed that their family obligations came first. But the two spiritual friends went to Mass together, served in hospitals and set up a secret chapel in an abandoned tower of the palace where they prayed together.

When flood brought disease and famine to Rome, Frances gave orders that no one asking for help should be turned away. Frances and Vannozza did all they could to help the poor by taking corn, oil, wine and clothes to them. When her father-in-law found out, he was furious that they were giving away their precious supplies, especially when their own supplies ran out. Frances prayed to God and the empty corn loft and wine casks were miraculously full again. Both her father-in-law and her husband converted after witnessing this miracle.

Frances experienced great sorrows in her life. She lost 2 children to the plague and her husband was wounded so badly in a battle that he never fully recovered; Frances nursed him for the rest of his life. Despite her sorrows, she was also remarkably blessed by God. She had the gift of miracles and ecstasy, as well as being able to see her own guardian angel. She had revelations concerning Purgatory and Hell. She could read the secrets of consciences and detect plots of diabolical origins. She was well known for her humility, obedience and patience.

In 1425, she founded the Olivetan Oblates of Mary, a confraternity of pious women, neither cloistered nor bound by formal vows, but following a pattern of combining a life of prayer while answering the needs of society. In 1433, she founded a monastery to allow those who wanted to live this way of life a place to call home, with like-minded individuals. When her husband died, she moved into the monastery and became the Mother Superior. She died on 9th March, 1440, a date she herself had predicted and is buried in Santa Francesca Romana in Rome.
