# SAINT OF THE WEEK

#### ST. RITA OF CASCIA (1381-1457) – Feast day 22nd May Patron Saint: Helpless cases, mothers, sickness, wounds, marital problems, abuse

St. Rita was born in Cascia, Italy to elderly parents, who, despite Rita's wish to become a nun, arranged for her to be married when she was 12 years old. Her husband Paulo Mancini was known to be a bad-tempered, immoral man and Rita bore his insults, physical abuse and infidelities for many years. Through her patience, humility and kindness Rita helped her husband to become a better man. There had been a feud between his family and another family (the Chiqui's) for many years, but it would seem that Rita's influence over her husband was strong enough that he renounced the family feud and became more genial and easier to live with.



The couple were blessed with two sons and lived a happy family life for a number of years.

Despite Paulo renouncing his involvement in the family feud, tragedy struck Rita's family when he was betrayed by his allies and fatally stabbed by a member of the Chiqui family. Rita was now a widow with two young sons to look after. Paulo's family, in particular his brother Bernardo, were hell bent on revenge for Paulo's death. Despite her loss Rita wanted no part of any revenge plot and pardoned her husband's killer at his funeral. Over time, however, her sons came under the influence of their uncle and wished to avenge their father's murder. Rita was beside herself and worried that her sons actions would put their mortal souls in danger. She tried to dissuade them from their course of action but to no avail. Rita prayed earnestly to God to remove her sons from the cycle of vendetta and revenge they had found themselves in. Within a year, both Rita's sons were dead from dysentery; many believed this was God's answer to Rita's prayers. Her sons died a natural death rather than risking their souls if they had committed murder.

Rita was now alone in life, with no family. Her faith was a great comfort to her and kept her going in her bleakest moments. Her childhood wish, to become a nun, became a calling she couldn't ignore; she desired to become an Augustinian nun in the convent in Cascia. Initially the nuns refused her, because of the ongoing feud between the Mancini's and Chiqui's. Many of the nuns were from these families and they feared that Rita would bring division and animosity into the convent. Rita persisted with her requests and the nuns told her that if she could help broker peace between the families, she could enter the convent. St Rita turned to God and her three patron saints, St. John the Baptist, St. Augustine and St. Nicholas of Tolentino to help her cause! Little by little she worked at bring the two families together and eventually peace was agreed and she was accepted into the convent. Legend has it that she was transported during the night into the locked convent by her three patron saints.

For thirty years, Rita lived out her childhood calling as an Augustinian nun in the Cascia convent, living a life of prayer and penance, work and charity. Rita was particularly devoted to the Sufferings of Our Lord. One day while she was meditating before an image of Christ crucified, a small wound appeared on her forehead, as though a thorn from the crown which was placed on Our Lord's head had fallen off and penetrated her own head. This partial stigmata was visible and remained on Rita's forehead for the rest of her life. Rita bore this open wound patiently and with great love for many years.

A relative who had come to visit Rita towards the end of her life asked her if there was anything she wanted. Rita replied, she would love a rose from her own garden. The only problem was that it was January, not the season for roses to be blooming! However, when her relative went to the house, a single blooming rose was found in the garden and brought back to Rita. Rita's body, which has remained incorrupt for centuries, lies in her home town of Cascia, at the shrine which bears her name.

St. Rita is an example and inspiration to so many people because, in her own life, she shared the experiences of many through her different ways of life – wife, mother, widow, Religious – she has an encouraging and consoling message for everyone.
