

THE VEIL OF THE TABERNACLE – SYMBOLISM AND MEANING

In a Catholic Church, the Tabernacle occupies the place of greatest honour (CCC 183). This is because it contains the Blessed Sacrament - Jesus Christ Himself, Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity, under the appearance of bread. God dwells in the midst of His people now, as He did all those years ago when He told Moses 'Build me a sanctuary so that I may dwell among them' (Exodus 25:8). On the top of Mount Sinai, in the presence of God, Moses was given a very specific set of instructions of how to make this dwelling place for the Lord.

The first tabernacle was a tent-like structure which had within it, a courtyard, an inner Holy Place and within that the Holy of Holies. The Holy of Holies was where the Ark of the Covenant was placed, separated from the Holy Place by a veil. The purpose of the veil was to enforce the separation of Yahweh (who sat on the Throne of Mercy above the Ark of the Covenant) from His sinful people. The veil was a barrier to make sure that man could not carelessly and irreverently enter into God's awesome presence. Only the High Priest was allowed to enter on one day of the year, the Day of



Atonement (Yom Kippur) and even then, only after he had meticulously prepared himself. Anyone else who entered the Holy of Holies would die. This separation of God from His people came about as a result of the fall of Adam and Eve; we were no longer worthy to be in His presence.



The veil was one of the most ornate objects in the tabernacle, woven from fine linen and blue, purple, and scarlet yarn. Skilled craftsmen embroidered figures on it of cherubim, angelic beings who protect the throne of God. Golden statues of two winged cherubim also knelt on the cover of the ark. Four pillars of acacia wood, overlaid with gold and with silver bases, supported the veil. It hung by gold hooks and clasps. It was a huge piece of material that was at least 30 feet high and reportedly the width of a hand, in order to completely hide the Holy of Holies.

In Matthew's account of Jesus' Passion, at the moment of Jesus' death, he writes that *the veil of the Temple was torn in two, from top to bottom' (Matthew 27;51).* This is profoundly significant; it would be impossible for a human being to do this to the veil, no one but God could have done this, given its size and thickness. Matthew highlights the direction in which it is torn; from top to bottom, from heaven to earth. He also tells us that the veil was torn in two, it has been irretrievably damaged. The barrier between God and His people has been destroyed and cannot be replaced. As shocking as that would have been at the time, it is wonderful news for us! We are once again able to be in the presence of God, to approach Him directly as a result of the death of Jesus. His death, His blood, the ultimate sacrifice, has established the new covenant with which we are reunited with God.

THE VEIL OF THE TABERNACLE – SYMBOLISM AND MEANING



Our own tabernacle has recently been cleaned and restored and we have installed our own veil, representing the torn veil in the temple. The beautiful exterior of our tabernacle has two cherubim, one either side of the door, echoing the design of the original Ark of the Covenant. An interesting feature on our tabernacle is the image of the marble pelican above the brass doors. If, like me, you are wondering why a pelican feeding its young is on the tabernacle, let me enlighten you! It is rooted in an ancient legend that in times of famine, the mother pelican would wound herself with her beak and feed her young with her own blood, ultimately resulting in her own death. You don't have to look too hard to see how early Christians used this legend to symbolise the self-sacrificing love of Jesus, who gave His life for our own redemption. Jesus continues to feed us with His Body and Blood in the Holy Eucharist. This image of the pelican feeding its young has made its way into our liturgical tradition and artwork and can often be found on altar fronts and tabernacles.

I had never heard of the legend of the pelican or its place in our liturgical history. As I am discovering, there is always something to learn about our Catholic faith! It is so beautiful, rich in history, tradition and symbolism. *Deo Gratias!*
